### A letter from our Executive Director.

### Greetings!

My name is Mike Williams and I have the honor of serving as the Executive Director of Citizens Project. When I started this role two years ago, the organization was at a crossroads that challenged us to reconsider how we operate. Our goal was not just to survive, but flourish, though this required us to answer two questions: first, how do we meet the expectations of our sustainers and the communities we have traditionally served while also recognizing and addressing a host of new challenges and threats to the well-being of traditionally marginalized communities in the Pikes Peak region? Second, how do we best communicate our dedication and expanded vision to these communities?

The answer to both questions is simple: as a constituent-led organization, we must continue centering the community while also boosting the mutual support required for expanding our future projects.

Today I can proudly report that Citizens Project is doing just that, and we are thriving again. Over the last 14 months, we have provided El Paso County with our "Get Out the Vote" programming for all three elections, including our popular candidate surveys and forums. We proudly partnered with the African American Trade Association to push back against the significant barriers to home ownership in the black community by hosting the first Black Home Ownership Event. We organized four Community Engagement events to solicit community feedback. In September of 2023, we sought to increase civic engagement among younger folks by hosting the first annual Beats and Ballots Festival in Acacia Park, and hundreds of people turned out. We sought to meet younger people in the community where they were at. Our organization participated in the African American Youth Leadership Conference, conducting sessions with both students and parents on civic involvement, and providing tools and resources for rallying communities. I also had the opportunity to speak with students at Pikes Peak State College about the importance of civic engagement and to guest lecture about defending democracy at Colorado College.

While maintaining our old partnerships, we forged new ones with organizations such as Neighbors for Education, the Latina Equity Foundation, and Men of Influence. We hosted over 200 people at our annual Creating Community Breakfast. Finally, we showed support for the LGBTQIA+ community impacted by the horrific tragedy at Club Q.

30 years in, our work is only just beginning. At Citizens Project, we are not just here to show up. We want to partner with communities to fight for systemic changes so everyone can experience equity in El Paso County. In 2024, we will work to create a world wherein no member of this community is marginalized. We will continue to expand the reach and efficiency of our programs as we look toward the next several years. This work is valuable, and it depends on your support. I want to personally thank you for your partnership and humbly ask that you support our continued efforts through volunteering, engaging in events, and/or giving monetarily. Citizens Project looks forward to the next 30 years of impact in El Paso County.

## programs and events.

Citizens Project offers many community programs and events, several of which are highlighted below.

### Beats and Ballots.

In September, Citizens Project presented the inaugural Beats and Ballots. This free event took place at Acacia Park in downtown Colorado Springs and served as a kick-off to the election season, with a focus on engaging young voters. Hundreds of attendees enjoyed music from local artists, heard from state and local elected officials about the value of civic engagement, and connected with some of the dozens of local nonprofits that set up a booth at the day-long event.

### **Community Engagement Series.**

As a constituent-led organization, meeting regularly with members of the community is integral to the work we do. Thanks in part to generous grants from the Colorado Health Foundation and the Colorado Trust, Citizens Project was able to meet quarterly with hundreds of members throughout the year to discuss our work, its implications for the city, and ways we can better empower the individuals and organizations we work with.

### Voter Education.

In addition to community-requested education events, such as our Voter 101, Citizens Project staff connected with hundreds of elementary, middle, high school, and college students at schools and events throughout the city. From the annual African American Youth Leadership Conference to quarterly parent resource nights, Citizens Project engaged children and their families about their voting rights and the importance of having their voices heard.

### resources.

Citizens Project provides resources to empower individuals and the community.

Below are a few of the year's most impactful.

### **Low Voter Turnout Survey.**

Through a grant from the Colorado Trust at the end of 2022, Citizens Project was able to work with students from UCCS and Colorado College to conduct a study in Southeast Colorado Springs identifying barriers to voting. Citizens Project spoke with over 325 registered and non-registered voters about their experiences, giving valuable insight into the challenges people are currently facing. The results of the study are available as a resource on our website for all to use, and a two-year follow-up study is set for the fall of 2024.

### Candidate Survey.

Citizens Project once again provided El Paso County residents with the most comprehensive candidate survey for both the municipal election in April and the coordinated election in November. Citizens Project worked with community members to ensure that their questions were being answered, and secured responses from more candidates than any other organization. Citizens Project provided a free, shortened version of the voter guide to hundreds of thousands of members of the community through the *Independent* and *Business Journal* newspapers as well as strategic dropoff areas throughout the city. The full 90-page survey is available on our website.

### Candidate Forums.

Working in partnership with several civic-oriented nonprofits, such as the League of Women Voters and the Latina Equity Foundation, Citizens Project co-hosted 14 candidate forums throughout Colorado Springs. With a focus on bringing candidates to parts of town that tend to be neglected, we saw over 1,000 people attend the forums, with over 900 of those people attending in-person.




